Currency (Commemorative Coins) (No 6) Regulations 2025

(made: 11 December 2025)

(commencement: on publication)

(published: 12 December 2025)

I make these regulations by order under section 22 of the Currency Ordinance 1987 in accordance with section 66(2)(e) of the Falkland Islands Constitution Order 2008 because in my judgement the matter is too unimportant.

1. Title

These regulations are the Currency (Commemorative Coins) (No 6) Regulations 2025.

2. Commencement

These regulations come into force on publication in the *Gazette*.

3. Commemorative coins that may be minted

For the purposes of section 6(5)(a) of the Currency Ordinance 1987, the Commissioners may arrange the minting of the commemorative coins described in the Schedule.

4. Deemed denomination of Sovereign coins and their value as legal tender

(1) For the purposes of the Ordinance the deemed denomination of the Sovereign coins authorised by this order in relation to —

- (i) the 1/10 Sovereign coins is 10 pence;
- (ii) the 1/8 Sovereign coins is 13 pence;
- (iii) the 1/4 Sovereign coins is 25 pence;
- (iv) the 1/2 Sovereign coins is 50 pence;
- (v) the 1 Sovereign coins is £1;

(vi) the 2 Sovereign coins is £2; and

(vii) the 5 Sovereign coins is £5.

(2) The coins specified under paragraph (1) are legal tender in the Falkland Islands in the amount of their deemed denomination.

1. SUMMARY

This report:

- (a) provides information on United Kingdom laws which have been made (or published) between 1 October and 31 December 2025; and
- (b) makes recommendations about the application of United Kingdom laws to the Falkland Islands.

The Legislative Assembly is invited to pass a resolution approving the recommendations of this report, in the form set out in Schedule 2 to this report.

2. BACKGROUND

2.1 Section 25 of the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017 requires the Statute Law Commissioner to regularly report to the Legislative Assembly about the application of United Kingdom laws; ordinarily monthly.

2.2 The last report was made to the Assembly on 30 October 2025 covering the period between 1 August and 30 September 2025.

2.3 The reason for producing regular reports in relation to United Kingdom laws is to enable the Assembly to work with the Statute Law Commissioner and Directorates to ensure that -

- (a) United Kingdom laws which apply in the Falkland Islands are readily identifiable and accessible; and
- (b) the adoption of United Kingdom laws is managed to ensure the most effective use of legislative resource.

2.4 United Kingdom laws apply to the Falkland Islands by two routes;

- (a) by direct application by decision of United Kingdom authorities;
- (b) by adoption by decision of the Falkland Islands (through the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017).

2.5 The purpose of monitoring United Kingdom laws and reporting on them is to enable the Legislative Assembly to understand what United Kingdom laws have been made during the reporting period and, where relevant, to make decisions about their continuing application to the Falkland Islands.

2.6 The report firstly identifies, for information, any laws that apply to the Falkland Islands directly by decision of the United Kingdom authorities.

2.7 Secondly, in respect of the adoption of UK law by the Falkland Islands, the report enables the Assembly to determine:

- (a) whether any changes made to UK laws which have been adopted by the Falkland Islands should continue to apply in the Falkland Islands (ie where such changes automatically apply to the Falkland Islands under the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance); and
- (b) whether any new UK law which does not apply in the Falkland Islands should be adopted by the Falkland Islands.

2.8 **13 Acts** have been passed and approximately **310 statutory instruments** were made or published in the reporting period.

3. UNITED KINGDOM LAWS PASSED OR MADE IN THE REPORTING PERIOD

3.1 Section 25 of the Ordinance provides ten categories of United Kingdom law which must be separately listed in this report. Those categories, and the relevant United Kingdom laws under them, are listed in the paragraphs below.

Paragraphs 3.2.1 to 3.2.6	concern the application of United Kingdom law to the Falkland Islands by decision of United Kingdom authorities (<u>directly applied law</u>)
Paragraphs 3.2.7 to 3.2.8	concern the application of United Kingdom law to the Falkland Island under the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017 (<u>adopted UK law</u>)
Paragraphs 3.2.9 to 3.2.10	provide information about other United Kingdom laws, ie in terms of the <u>potential</u> for adoption in the Falkland Islands

3.2 LISTS OF UK LAWS:

3.2.1 List each UK Act passed in the reporting period which provides expressly, or by necessary implication, for the Act's extension to or application in the Falkland Islands (DIRECTLY APPLIED):

- a. **The Border Security, Asylum and Immigration Act 2025 c. 31**

[Border Security, Asylum and Immigration Act 2025](#)

The Act makes various new measures in relation to borders, asylum and immigration in UK, and repeals legislation reflecting the former Conservative government's policies, such as the Safety of Rwanda (Immigration and Asylum) Act 2024 and the Illegal Migration Act 2023.

Parts of the Illegal Migration Act 2023 extended to the British overseas territories. The provisions restricted eligibility for British and British overseas territories citizenship in connection with persons who had entered the UK or British overseas territories illegally.

The relevant parts of the 2023 Act are repealed, and consequential amendments are made to the British Nationality Act 1981. Those repeals and amendments are similarly extended to the British overseas territories.

Concerns were expressed by a number of bodies that parts of the Illegal Migration Act 2023 may not be consistent with the UK's international obligations. This is thought to be relevant to the decision to make these repeals.

The Legislative Assembly were advised at the time that parts of the Illegal Migration Act 2023 was extended to the British overseas territories that the provisions were unlikely to have any significant, if any, practical effect in connection with the Falkland Islands (because there is no known association between illegal migration and the Falkland Islands).

Similarly the repeal of those provisions is unlikely to have any practical impact in connection with the Falkland Islands.

The relevant provisions came into force on 2 December 2025.

No amendment is required to the Statute Law Database to reflect the extension of the applicable parts of this Act to the Falkland Islands because the applicable provisions are merely amending (in connection with the British Nationality Act 1981).

SUMMARY: Parts of the Act extend to the British overseas territories. The provisions restore the law to the position in 2023 prior to introduction of the Illegal Migration Act 2023, which is unlikely to have any practical impact in connection with the Falkland Islands.

b. The Deprivation of Citizenship Orders (Effect during Appeal) Act c. 25

[Deprivation of Citizenship Orders \(Effect during Appeal\) Act 2025](#)

The Act regulates the position of a person who has been deprived of their citizenship under section 40 of the British Nationality Act 1981.

A recent UK court case highlighted that if a person's appeal against deprivation of citizenship under section 40 is successful, their citizenship is automatically reinstated, with retrospective effect.

The implications of this are significant, particularly in cases where a decision to deprive citizenship has been made on the basis that the person poses a threat to national security. A person who may be overseas may seek to enter the UK or to renounce any other nationality they hold before the Home Office has had an opportunity to exhaust the appeal process.

The Act has effect so that a deprivation order remains in force during the period during which the Home Secretary may appeal the decision to reinstate the citizenship.

The Act came into force on 27 October 2025 (although the provisions of the Act operate retrospectively in relation to relevant appeals which remain current).

The British Nationality Act 1981 extends to the British overseas territories to provide the legislative framework in connection with British nationality in those territories, so the 2025 Act similarly extends directly to the British overseas territories.

Deprivation of British citizenship is a very significant step, rarely taken (averaging 36 people a year in the period 2010-2018 -[Nationality and Borders Bill: Deprivation of citizenship factsheet - GOV.UK](#)). It is not known if deprivation of citizenship has ever occurred in connection with a citizen in the Falkland Islands, but the Act is unlikely to be of significant, or any relevance in the Islands.

Amendment is needed to the Statute Law Database to reflect the application of the Act under Falkland Islands law.

SUMMARY: The Act makes administrative provision in connection with appeals against deprivation of citizenship under the British Nationality Act 1981 – and this provision is extended directly to all British overseas territories (although is unlikely to have significant, if any, practical effect in the Falkland Islands due to the rarity of deprivation of citizenship).

3.2.2 List each UK Act passed in the reporting period which provides for the Act's extension to or application in, the Falkland Islands by Order in Council (DIRECTLY APPLIED):

3.2.4 List any Order in Council made in the reporting period providing for a UK enactment [ie Act or instrument] to extend to or apply in the Falkland Islands (DIRECTLY APPLIED)

Note – also listed under this category are UK regulations etc which provide for their own extension to the Falkland Islands.

a. The Sanctions (Miscellaneous Amendments) (Overseas Territories) Order 2025 - SI 2025/1307

[The Sanctions \(Miscellaneous Amendments\) \(Overseas Territories\) Order 2025](#)

The Order extends directly to the British overseas territories, including the Falkland Islands.

The Order amends 35 sets of sanctions regulations which have previously been extended to the British overseas territories.

Whilst the relevant sanctions regimes apply to the territories “as amended from time to time”, amendment of the relevant UK legislation is confirmed in the Falkland Islands by subsequent formal amendment of the relevant regulations as they have been extended to the British overseas territories. The original UK amendments to the sanctions regime are reported on to the Assembly at the relevant time.

The Order came into force on 11 December 2025.

No amendment is needed to the Statute Law Database to reflect the application of this Order, because it is merely amending (section 11(2)(d) Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017).

SUMMARY: The Order extends directly to the Falkland Islands and makes updates to the law concerning a large number of international sanctions regimes which have been extended to the Falkland Islands.

b. The Extradition Act 2003 (Amendment to Designations) Order 2025 - SI 2025/1214

[The Extradition Act 2003 \(Amendment to Designations\) Order 2025](#)

The Order amends the Extradition Act 2003 (Designation of Part 2 Territories) Order 2003 (SI 2003/3334 [The Extradition Act 2003 \(Designation of Part 2 Territories\) Order 2003](#)).

The 2003 Order is made under the Extradition Act 2003, which makes provision about extradition arrangements between the UK and other countries.

The Act has been extended to British Overseas Territories, in part, in modified form by the Extradition Act 2003 (Overseas Territories) Order 2016 (SI 2016 [The Extradition Act 2003 \(Overseas Territories\) Order 2016](#)). This provides the framework for extradition between the Falkland Islands and other territories.

The 2003 Order designates territories under Part 2 of the Act; being non-EU territories with whom the UK has formal arrangements through the European Convention on Extradition, the Commonwealth Scheme or a bilateral treaty.

These territories are then further designated as category A or B. Type A countries are not required to provide certain evidence in response to their request for extradition – Type B countries are still required to do so.

A territory may also be “de-designated” under Part 2 because extradition arrangements between UK and the relevant country have changed. In that case extradition requests must be determined on a case by case basis.

The amendments made to the 2003 Regulations are:

- Change in the designation of Chile from a category B territory to a Category A territory; and
- de-designation of Hong Kong and Zimbabwe from Part 2 of the Act.

The effect of regulation 2(2)(b) and 2(3) of the Extradition Act 2003 (Overseas Territories) Order 2016 is that the amendments made to the designation of countries under the Act apply automatically to the British overseas territories.

This means that the 2025 Order has effect in the Falkland Islands.

Chile’s accession to the European Convention on Extradition, together with these amendments, might, potentially, make extradition between the Falkland Islands and Chile easier (although practical understanding of the potential impacts has not been discussed with UK authorities).

The Order came into force on 26 November 2025.

No amendment is needed to the Statute Law Database to reflect the application of this Order, because it is merely amending (section 11(2)(d) Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017).

SUMMARY: The Order amends the designation of certain countries for the purposes of extradition arrangements between the United Kingdom and those countries. The same arrangements apply to the Falkland Islands automatically by direct application of the relevant UK laws. The Order alters arrangements for extradition with Chile; potentially making the process easier.

c. The Compensation for Miscarriages of Justice (Alteration of Overall Compensation Limits) Order 2025 - SI 2025/1139

[The Compensation for Miscarriages of Justice \(Alteration of Overall Compensation Limits\) Order 2025](#)

The Order is made under the Armed Forces Act 2006, which extends to the British overseas territories, including the Falkland Islands. The effect of section 384(2) of that Act is that the amendments made to it by this Order also apply in the Falkland Islands.

The Order increases the overall compensation limits (caps) that apply to compensation paid by the Secretary of State under the miscarriage of justice compensation schemes provided by ss276 – 276B of the Armed Forces Act 2006.

This is highly unlikely to have any significant effect in the Falkland Islands because it concerns the administration of justice in connection with the regular UK Armed Forces.

The Order came into force on 29 October 2025.

No amendment is needed to the Statute Law Database to reflect the application of this Order, because the applicable part is merely amending (section 11(2)(d) Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017).

SUMMARY: This Order applies in the Falkland Islands to amend the Armed Forces Act 2006, but is highly unlikely have any significant effect in the Falkland Islands because it concerns the administration of justice relating to members of the regular UK Armed Forces.

d. The Armed Forces Act 2006 (Continuation) Order 2025 - SI 2025/1096

[The Armed Forces Act 2006 \(Continuation\) Order 2025](#)

The Order extends to the British overseas territories, including the Falkland Islands.

The Order provides for the continuation in effect of the Armed Forces Act 2006, which would otherwise expire at the end of 2026.

The Act applies in the Falkland Islands to regulate service discipline etc in connection with the regular UK Armed Forces.

No amendment is needed to the Statute Law Database to reflect the application of this Order, because it is merely amending (section 11(2)(d) Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017).

SUMMARY: This Order applies in the Falkland Islands to provide for the continuation of the Armed Forces Act 2006, which applies to regulate service discipline etc in connection with the regular UK Armed Forces.

e. The Global Irregular Migration and Trafficking in Persons Sanctions (Overseas Territories) Order 2025 - SI 2025/1092

[The Global Irregular Migration and Trafficking in Persons Sanctions \(Overseas Territories\) Order 2025](#)

The Order extends directly to the British overseas territories, including the Falkland Islands.

The Order extends the Global Irregular Migration and Trafficking in Persons Sanctions Regulations 2025 (SI 2025/902 [The Global Irregular Migration and Trafficking in Persons Sanctions Regulations 2025](#)) to the Falkland Islands.

The Order also extends certain provisions of the Sanctions and Anti-Money Laundering Act 2018 to the Falkland Islands; sections 44, 52(3), and 53.

Both the Regulations and the sections of the Act are subject to modifications set out in the Order.

The Regulations were made under the Sanctions Act 2018 to establish a sanctions regime to prevent people smuggling, trafficking persons, and causing migration for the purpose of destabilising a country.

The Regulations provide for persons to be designated by the Secretary of State as being involved in such activities. Designated persons may be excluded from the Falkland Islands and made subject to financial sanctions.

Exceptions are made from the regime, and the Governor may, with the consent of the Secretary of State, licence certain activities which would otherwise be prohibited. The Governor is also required to publish lists of designated persons.

Powers to provide and share information enable the effective implementation and enforcement of the sanctions regime. Criminal offences are created in connection with breach of the Regulations.

The sections of the 2018 Act which are extended to the Falkland Islands contain further administrative provisions in connection with the sanctions regime.

Amendment is needed to the Statute Law Database to reflect the application of the Order and Act under Falkland Islands law.

SUMMARY: The Order imposes a new international sanctions regime in the Falkland Islands for the purpose of preventing people smuggling and trafficking etc.

3.2.5 List any statutory instrument made in the reporting period under a UK Act which amends a provision which extends to or applies in the Falkland Islands by virtue of express provision of the enabling Act or of an Order in Council, where the amendment also extends to or applies in the Falkland Islands by virtue of express provision of the enabling Act or of an Order in Council, or by necessary implication (DIRECTLY APPLIED):

a. The Central African Republic (Sanctions) (EU Exit) (Amendment) Regulations 2025 - SI 2025/1327

[The Central African Republic \(Sanctions\) \(EU Exit\) \(Amendment\) Regulations 2025](#)

The Regulations amend the Central African Republic (Sanctions) (EU Exit) Regulations 2020 (SI 2020/6016 [The Central African Republic \(Sanctions\) \(EU Exit\) Regulations 2020](#))

The 2020 Regulations have been extended to most of the British Overseas Territories, including the Falkland Islands, “as amended from time to time”. On this basis the amendments are understood to automatically apply to the Falkland Islands.

The amendments to the 2020 Regulations are technical changes to update them in line with the most recent United Nations Security Council resolutions. But the changes also reflect an element of relaxation of sanctions due to progress the Central African Republic is making towards stability.

No amendment is needed to the Statute Law Database to reflect the application of these Regulations, because they are merely amending (section 11(2)(d) Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017).

SUMMARY: The Regulations make changes to the Central African Republic sanctions regime which has been extended to the Falkland Islands, and the amendments apply automatically in the Falkland Islands.

b. The Iran (Sanctions) (Nuclear) (EU Exit) (Amendment) Regulations 2025 SI - 2025/1052

[The Iran \(Sanctions\) \(Nuclear\) \(EU Exit\) \(Amendment\) Regulations 2025](#)

These Regulations amend the Iran (Sanctions) (Nuclear) (EU Exit) Regulations 2019 (SI 2019/461 [The Iran \(Sanctions\) \(Nuclear\) \(EU Exit\) Regulations 2019](#)).

The 2019 Regulations have been extended to most of the British Overseas Territories, including the Falkland Islands, “as amended from time to time”. On this basis the amendments are understood to automatically apply to the Falkland Islands.

The amendments to the 2019 Regulations are technical amendments in connection with the enforcement of UN sanctions due to significant Iranian non-performance of its commitments to the Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action which the 2019 regulations seek to implement. The amendments ensure that the UK abides by its obligations as a UN member state.

No amendment is required to the Statute Law Database to reflect the application of these Regulations, because they are merely amending (section 11(2)(d) Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017).

SUMMARY: The Regulations make minor, technical, changes to the Iranian nuclear sanctions regime which has been extended to the Falkland Islands, and the amendments apply automatically in the Falkland Islands.

ACTS:

a. Planning and Infrastructure Act 2025 c. 34

[Planning and Infrastructure Act 2025](#)

The Act makes new domestic provision in relation to planning and infrastructure in the UK; principally through amendment of the Planning Act 2008.

The Falkland Islands has its own Planning regime, under the Planning Ordinance 1991 [Falkland Islands Legislation](#) and the 2008 Act does not apply.

However, the 2025 Act also makes a small number of amendments to the Highways Act 1980. The 1980 Act has been adopted in the Falkland Islands. The effect of section 24(2) of the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017 is that the amendments to the 1980 Act apply automatically in the Falklands Islands.

The amendments, for example, involve complex arrangements for highways such as the involvement of “strategic highways companies”. Such arrangements simply do not exist in the Falkland Islands, where highways are maintained and constructed by the Falkland Islands Government as the Highways Authority. It is not considered that any of the amendments are likely to be of any practical effect in the Falkland Islands.

However, it is recommended that the amendments continue in force for coherence and continuity of the law.

Similarly, the 2025 Act makes minor amendments to the New Roads and Street Works Act 1991 (eg concerning the installation of public charging points).

The 1991 Act has been adopted in the Falkland Islands, and the effect of the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017 is that these amendments apply automatically.

Application of the 1991 Act in the Falkland Islands is under consideration by the Director of Public Works (on a non-urgent basis) with a view to potential repeal. In the mean time, for coherence and continuity of the law, no recommendations are made to change the continuing rolling application of the Act and its amendments pending that consideration.

The relevant amendments largely come into force on 18 February 2026.

No amendment is required to the Statute Law Database to reflect the application of parts of the Act, because the applicable parts are merely amending (section 11(2)(d) Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017).

SUMMARY: The majority of the 2025 Act does not apply in the Falkland Islands. Only minor amendments apply, by virtue of the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance

2017, to some UK laws adopted in the Falkland Islands. Those amendments are not considered likely to be of any practical consequence in the Falkland Islands. **No recommendation for change.**

b. Mental Health Act 2025 c. 33

[Mental Health Act 2025](#)

The Mental Health Act 2025 significantly amends the Mental Health Act 1983.

The majority of the 1983 Act does not apply in the Falkland Islands – it has been replaced by the Mental Health Ordinance 2010 [Falkland Islands Legislation](#).

However, the 2025 Act does make some minor consequential amendments to some of the very small number of sections of the 1983 Act which remain adopted under Falkland Islands laws. The effect of section 24(2) of the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017 is that these amendments are automatically adopted in the Falkland Islands.

The sections of the 1983 Act which remain in place deal with the management of the property and affairs of patients (through the Court of Protection).

It is not thought that the amendments to these sections will be of any significant effect (if any), so no change is recommended to this position (and for the purposes of coherence and consistency of the law).

However, reference paragraph 3.2.9 below, it is recommended that the Department of Health and Social Services consider whether a review of Falkland Islands mental health legislation is required as a result of the development of UK law under the 2025 Act.

No amendment is required to the Statute Law Database to reflect the application of parts of the Act, because the applicable parts are merely amending (section 11(2)(d) Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017).

SUMMARY: The majority of the 2025 Act does not apply in the Falkland Islands. Minor amendments to the Mental Health Act 1983 do apply, but those amendments are not considered likely to be of any significant effect the Falkland Islands. **No change is recommended**

SECONDARY LEGISLATION:

a. The Merchant Shipping (Safety Measures for Ships Carrying Industrial Personnel and Special Personnel) Regulations 2025 - SI 2025/1298

[The Merchant Shipping \(Safety Measures for Ships Carrying Industrial Personnel and Special Personnel\) Regulations 2025](#)

The Regulations implement the new Chapter XV in the Annex to the International Convention for the Safety of Life at Sea, 1974 (SOLAS).

The Regulations amend the following regulations:

- Merchant Shipping (Survey and Certification) Regulations 2015 (SI 2015/508 [The Merchant Shipping \(Survey and Certification\) Regulations 2015](#))
- Merchant Shipping (Fees) Regulations 2018 (SI 2018/1104 [The Merchant Shipping \(Fees\) Regulations 2018](#))
- Merchant Shipping (Small Workboats and Pilot Boats) Regulations 2023 (SI 2023 [The Merchant Shipping \(Small Workboats and Pilot Boats\) Regulations 2023](#))

The Regulations came into force on 19 January 2026.

The amended regulations have been adopted in the Falkland Islands under the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017. The effect of section 24(2) of the 2017 Ordinance is that any amendments made to such adopted laws automatically apply as law of the Falkland Islands.

SOLAS has been extended to the Falkland Islands, which so there is an international obligation to implement any changes or updates to that Convention.

The Statute Law Commissioner will consult with the Maritime Authority whether the amendments which apply automatically under the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017 are adequate and appropriate to address the relevant new obligations under SOLAS, or whether additional provision is required. This may result in a recommendation in the next report to the Assembly that that whole 2025 Regulations should be adopted in the Falkland Islands, or may involve alternative proposals to suit the circumstances of the Falkland Islands' unique shipping register and traffic.

No amendment is required to the Statute Law Database to reflect the application of parts of these Regulations, because the applicable parts are merely amending (section 11(2)(d) Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017).

SUMMARY: The Regulations implement updates to the Safety of Life at Sea Convention, and are partly automatically adopted under the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017. Consultation with the Maritime Authority is outstanding in relation to the potential for any recommendations to be made in connection with the Regulations. **Recommendation pending.**

b. The Merchant Shipping (Marine Equipment) Regulations 2025 - SI 2025/1280

[The Merchant Shipping \(Marine Equipment\) Regulations 2025](#)

The Regulations require marine equipment on UK registered ships to be compliant with certain international and UK standards. The aim is also to simplify marine equipment regulations by consolidating and combining regulatory changes into one instrument. The instrument also brings the standards and requirements for Ballast Water Management Systems into the scope of the instrument – ensuring that equipment is not treated differently to other types of marine equipment.

The Regulations repeal and replace the Merchant Shipping (Marine Equipment) Regulations 2016 (SI 2016/1025) and make consequential amendments to a very large number of Merchant Shipping Statutory Instruments.

The Regulations came into force on 5 January 2026.

The Falkland Islands has not adopted the 2016 Regulations, but it has adopted many of the other instruments that are amended by these 2025 Regulations. Those amendments will apply automatically in the Falkland Islands under section 24(2) of the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017.

The Statute Law Commissioner will consult with the Maritime Authority whether the amendments which automatically apply in the Falkland Islands should be disapplied (or whether they have no material impact) and/or whether the substantive marine equipment regulations should be adopted to regulate marine equipment on Falkland Islands registered ships.

No amendment is required to the Statute Law Database to reflect the application of part these Regulations, because the relevant parts are merely amending (section 11(2)(d) Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017).

SUMMARY: The Regulations consolidate and improve standards of marine equipment, and are partly automatically adopted under the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017. Consultation with the Maritime Authority is outstanding in relation to the potential for any recommendations to be made in connection with the regulations. **Recommendation pending.**

c. The Human Medicines (Authorisation by Pharmacists and Supervision by Pharmacy Technicians) Order 2025 - SI 2025/1249

[The Human Medicines \(Authorisation by Pharmacists and Supervision by Pharmacy Technicians\) Order 2025](#)

The Order enables flexibility in the dispensing etc of medicines in the UK; in particular in connection with pharmacy technicians.

The Falkland Islands laws in relation to medicines and misuse of drugs are generally distinct from UK laws.

This means that most of the 2025 Order has no application in the Falkland Islands

However, the Falkland Islands have adopted some regulations to fill gaps in our legislative regime for misuse of drugs, including the Misuse of Drugs (Safe Custody) Regulations 1973 (SI 1973/798 [The Misuse of Drugs \(Safe Custody\) Regulations 1973](#)).

The 2025 Order makes consequential amendments to the 1973 Regulations, and the effect of section 24(2) of the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017 is that those amendments are automatically adopted in the Falkland Islands.

However, the 1973 Regulations are adopted only insofar as they are not inconsistent with the Misuse of Drugs Ordinance 1987. The Misuse of Drugs Ordinance 1987 does not make provision for pharmacy technicians, so it appears that the amendment will be of no practical effect. No change is therefore recommended (and for the purposes of coherence and consistency in the law)

It is recognised that misuse of drugs legislation is overdue review due to concerns about a failure to update provisions. Some work has started on this between the Directorate of Health and Social Services and the Legislation Team – but resources are limited so progress has been slow, and there is currently no estimate for report on this matter to Executive Council.

No amendment is required to the Statute Law Database to reflect the application of parts these Regulations, because the parts are merely amending (section 11(2)(d) Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017).

SUMMARY: Minor amendments made by the Order to the Misuse of Drugs (Safe Custody) Regulations 1973 are adopted automatically under the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017 in connection with pharmacy technicians. However, that is unlikely to be of any practical effect because of inconsistency with the Misuse of Drugs Ordinance 1987, which does not recognise pharmacy technicians. **No recommendation for change.**

d. The Family Procedure (Amendment) Rules 2025 - SI 2025/1242

[The Family Procedure \(Amendment\) Rules 2025](#)

The Rules amend the Family Procedure Rules 2010 (SI 2010/2955 [The Family Procedure Rules 2010 \(legislation.gov.uk\)](#)), which have been adopted under the law of the Falkland Islands.

The effect of section 24(2) of the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017 is that the amendments automatically apply in the Falkland Islands.

The whole of the 2010 Rules apply in the Falkland Islands, and no specific amendments apply to them. However, they can only apply insofar as they are relevant and can operate under Falkland Islands law; relevant and operational functionality is a matter for the court to determine.

Similarly, it would be for the court to determine to what extent the latest amendments can have effect in the Falkland Islands, and what parts must be considered irrelevant, and of no application to the Falkland Islands.

Different rules came into force on different dates in January, March and June 2026.

See also paragraph 3.2.8.

No amendment is required to the Statute Law Database to reflect the application of these Rules, because they are merely amending (section 11(2)(d) Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017).

SUMMARY: The amendments made under the Rules to Family Procedure Rules 2010 apply automatically in the Falkland Islands insofar as they can have effect in the Falkland Islands. **No recommendation for change.**

e. The Merchant Shipping (Polar Code) (Safety) Regulations 2025 - SI 2025/1234

[The Merchant Shipping \(Polar Code\) \(Safety\) Regulations 2025](#)

The Regulations revoke and replace the Merchant Shipping (Polar Code) (Safety) Regulations 2021 (SI 2021/1401); for the purposes of implementing the latest amendments to Chapter XIV of the Annex to SOLAS and to the Polar Code (made by IMO Resolutions MSC.532(107) and MSC.538(107) respectively – both adopted by IMO on 8 June 2023).

The Falkland Islands has not adopted the 2021 Regulations, but instead have their own Polar Code Regulations: [Falkland Islands Legislation](#).

However, the 2025 Regulations also amend other Merchant Shipping Regulations which have been adopted by the Falkland Islands:

- Merchant Shipping (Standards of Training, Certification and Watchkeeping) Regulations 2022 (2022/1342 [The Merchant Shipping \(Standards of Training, Certification and Watchkeeping\) Regulations 2022](#))
- Merchant Shipping (Survey and Certification) Regulations 2015 (SI 2015/508 [The Merchant Shipping \(Survey and Certification\) Regulations 2015](#))
- Merchant Shipping (Fees) Regulations 2018 (SI 2018/1104 [The Merchant Shipping \(Fees\) Regulations 2018](#))

The effect of the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017, section 24(2) is that these amendments will be automatically adopted in the Falkland Islands.

The 2025 Regulations came into force on 1 January 2026.

Although made in 2019, the Falkland Islands' Maritime (Polar Code) Regulations are intended to incorporate some "future proofing" as far as relevant amendments to

SOLAS and the Polar Code are concerned, by defining “Polar Code” as being the Code “amended and in force in the Falkland Islands from time to time”.

The Maritime Authority has been consulted in relation to the 2025 Regulations and whether or not the Falkland Islands’ regulations remain satisfactory.

The Maritime Authority has reviewed the relevant regulations with their Chief Marine Surveyor and concluded that there are no concerns with the application of the 2025 Regulations. They have also concluded that the Maritime (Polar Code) Regulations 2019 remain largely satisfactory in relation to the updated international obligations.

However, it is recommended that, when the opportunity arises, the 2019 Regulations are amended to clarify their application to certain fishing vessels (although it seems unlikely that Falkland Islands fishing vessels would wish to operate in polar waters, it cannot be ruled out).

No amendment is required to the Statute Law Database to reflect the application of parts of these Regulations, because the parts are merely amending (section 11(2)(d) Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017).

SUMMARY: The Regulations replace and update regulations in connection with the Polar Code made under the International Convention for the Safety of Life at Sea, 1973 (SOLAS). The Regulations do not generally apply to the Falkland Islands, but some consequential amendments to adopted Regulations do apply, and should continue to do so. **No recommendation for change.**

f. The Merchant Shipping (Vessels in Commercial Use for Sport or Pleasure Regulations 2025 - SI 2025/1195

[The Merchant Shipping \(Vessels in Commercial Use for Sport or Pleasure\) Regulations 2025](#)

The Regulations revoke and replace the Merchant Shipping (Vessels in Commercial Use for Sport or Pleasure) Regulations 1998 (SI 1998/2771).

The Falkland Islands has not adopted the 1998 Regulations.

However, the 2025 Regulations make consequential amendments to several instruments which have been adopted in the Falkland Islands. The effect of section 24(2) of the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017 is that those amendments apply automatically in the Falkland Islands.

The instruments whose amendment has effect are:

- The Merchant Shipping (Life-Saving Appliances and Arrangements) Regulations 2020 (SI 2020/501 [The Merchant Shipping \(Life-Saving Appliances and Arrangements\) Regulations 2020](#));

- The Merchant Shipping (Safety of Navigation) Regulations 2020 (SI 2020/673 [The Merchant Shipping \(Safety of Navigation\) Regulations 2020](#));
- The Merchant Shipping (Cargo and Passenger Ship Construction and Miscellaneous Amendments) Regulations 2023 (SI 2023/246 [The Merchant Shipping \(Cargo and Passenger Ship Construction and Miscellaneous Amendments\) Regulations 2023](#))
- The Merchant Shipping (Fire Protection) Regulations 2023 (SI 2023/568 [The Merchant Shipping \(Fire Protection\) Regulations 2023](#))

The Regulations came into force on 12 December 2025.

The Statute Law Commissioner will consult with the Maritime Authority whether the amendments which automatically apply in the Falkland Islands should be disapplied (or whether they have no material impact) and/or whether the substantive regulations should be adopted to regulate vessels in commercial use for sport or pleasure.

No amendment is required to the Statute Law Database to reflect the application of parts of these Regulations, because the applicable parts are merely amending (section 11(2)(d) Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017).

SUMMARY: The Regulations are adopted automatically under the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017 in part. Consultation with the Maritime Authority is outstanding in relation to the potential for any recommendations to be made in connection with the regulations, which will be addressed in the next regular report.
Recommendation pending.

g. The Merchant Shipping (Fees)(Amendment) Regulations 2025 - SI 2025/1103

[The Merchant Shipping \(Fees\) \(Amendment\) Regulations 2025](#)

The Regulations amend the Merchant Shipping (Fees) Regulations 2018 (SI 2018/1104 [The Merchant Shipping \(Fees\) Regulations 2018](#)).

The 2018 Regulations have been adopted in the Falkland Islands under the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017; to provide for appropriate fees in the connection with maritime regulation (except where there are fees provided for under the Falkland Islands Merchant Shipping (Registration of Ships) (Fees) Regulations 2005 ([Falkland Islands Legislation](#)), which take precedence over the 2018 Regulations).

The effect of section 24(2) of the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance is that the amendments apply automatically in the Falkland Islands.

The 2025 Regulations merely extend the effect of the 2018 Regulations, which would otherwise expire, and remove an unnecessary fee.

The Regulations came into force on 11 November 2025.

No amendment is required to the Statute Law Database to reflect the application of these Regulations, because they are merely amending (section 11(2)(d) Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017).

SUMMARY: The Regulations are adopted automatically under the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017 and should continue in force as amended by the 2025 Regulations to provide appropriate fees in connection with maritime regulation. **No recommendation for change.**

3.2.8 List any UK statutory instrument made in the reporting period under a UK enactment which applies in the Falkland Islands by virtue of section 23 of the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017 (ADOPTED):

The Family Procedure (Amendment) Rules 2025 – SI 2025/1243

See also paragraph 3.2.7.

The Family Procedure (Amendment) Rules 2025 are made under the Courts Act 2003 (which has been adopted as part of court practice and procedure provided in accordance with section 48 of the Administration of Justice Ordinance 1949).

The effect of section 23 of the Law Revision and Publication Ordinance 2017 is that the Rules are also adopted as the law of the Falkland Islands to the extent that they are made under that Act (and subject to the same limitations of the application of the Act).

SUMMARY: The amendments made under the Rules to Family Procedure Rules apply automatically in the Falkland Islands because they are made under an adopted Act. **No recommendation for change.**

3.2.9 List every UK Act passed in the reporting period not listed above (ie Acts which do not apply in the Falkland Islands in any way – POTENTIAL FOR ADOPTION):

a. Employment Rights c. 36

[Employment Rights Act 2025](#)

The Act introduces a wide range of employment protection rights in areas such as “zero hours” contracts, flexible working, statutory sick pay, sexual harassment, unfair dismissal, trade unions, and enforcement of those rights. The law is introduced largely through amendment of the Employment Rights Act 1996.

The Falkland Islands has its own Employment Protection Ordinance 1989 [Falkland Islands Legislation](#). This means that it is not practicable to adopt amending UK legislation in this area.

The Falkland Islands law in this area was originally based on UK legislation, but has not been modernised. Significant policy development would be required to carry out that task.

b. Space Industry (Indemnities) Act 2025 c. 35

[Space Industry \(Indemnities\) Act 2025](#)

The Act amends the Space Industry Act 2018 to provide for the limitation of indemnities granted by space industry operators. This is intended to enable the industry to develop in the UK consistent with international practice (ie it removes a prohibitive burden).

The Falkland Islands has not adopted the Space Industry Act 2018, so this amending Act is not suitable for adoption. There is not thought to be any current need for the Falkland Islands to regulate a space industry.

c. Planning and Infrastructure Act 2025 c. 34

[Planning and Infrastructure Act 2025](#)

The Act largely makes domestic provision for planning and infrastructure regulation in UK, and is not relevant to the Falkland Islands.

See paragraph 3.2.7.

d. Mental Health Act 2025 c. 33

[Mental Health Act 2025](#)

The Act reflects a comprehensive reform of the law relating to the treatment and detention of mentally disordered persons. It is particularly intended to strengthen the voice of patients subject to the Act, increase the scrutiny of detention, and to limit the use of the Act to detain people with a learning disability and autistic people.

The relevant provisions of the Act have not been adopted in the Falkland Islands; the Falkland Islands has its own law; the Mental Health Ordinance 2010 [Falkland Islands Legislation](#).

The 2025 Act achieves it aims through amendment of the Mental Health Act 1983. That means that the 2025 Act is not suitable for adoption in the Falkland Islands.

However, it could be considered by the Department of Health and Social Services whether a review of the 2010 Ordinance is warranted as a result of the developments in the UK law.

e. Dogs (Protection of Livestock) (Amendment) Act 2025 c. 32

[Dogs \(Protection of Livestock\) \(Amendment\) Act 2025](#)

The Dogs (Protection of Livestock) Act 2025 amends the Dogs (Protection of Livestock) Act 1953 in connection with “livestock worrying”.

The 1953 Act does not apply in the Falkland Islands, so the Act is not suitable for adoption in the Falkland Islands.

The Dogs Ordinance 1944 contains the main regulation of dogs under the laws of the Falkland Islands, and includes provision that a dog owner is liable for injury caused to domestic animals or poultry by the dog. The provisions might no longer be considered fit for purpose, but there has not been considered to be a problem of sufficient scale to make reform of the legislation a priority.

f. Animal Welfare (Import of Dogs, Cats and Ferrets) Act 2025 c. 30

[Animal Welfare \(Import of Dogs, Cats and Ferrets\) Act 2025](#)

The Act was the result of a private Member's Bill introduced into the UK Parliament. It has the narrow and specific aims of improving welfare in connection with the importation and movement of dogs, cats and ferrets into and within the United Kingdom; essentially with a view to seeking to limit the effects of "puppy farming" and similar activities.

The provisions are not believed to be relevant or appropriate for adoption in the Falkland Islands.

g. Property (Digital Assets etc) Act 2025 c. 29

[Property \(Digital Assets etc\) Act 2025](#)

The Act is extremely brief, and simply clarifies the certain digital assets such as "crypto-tokens" can be recognised as property, even if they do not fit into the two traditional categories of property recognised by the common law.

The clarity is thought to be necessary to help provide certainty and protection for people and businesses who own and transact with digital assets.

It is not thought likely that there is any significant trade in digital assets in the Falkland Islands. So there does not appear to be a need for such a clarifying law in the Falkland Islands.

However, if the Legislative Assembly believes that this is an area of concern, the Act is a short, stand-alone Act, which simply supplements the common law in an area of developing technology, so could, potentially, be adopted as part of Falkland Islands law.

h. Public Authorities (Fraud, Error and Recovery) Act 2025 c. 28

[Public Authorities \(Fraud, Error and Recovery\) Act 2025](#)

The Act makes UK domestic provision in connection with social security fraud etc, and is not relevant to the Falkland Islands.

i. Absent Voting (Elections in Scotland and Wales) Act 2025 c. 27

[Absent Voting \(Elections in Scotland and Wales\) Act 2025](#)

The Act makes UK domestic provision in relation to elections and is not relevant to the Falkland Islands.

j. Renters' Rights Act 2025 c. 26

[Renters' Rights Act 2025](#)

The Act aims to reform private renting (ie between private landlords and tenants rather than in relation to Government/social housing). It is intended to provide renters with more security in relation to their rental properties, and to provide other protections for tenants including improving the standards of rental properties.

The Act seeks to achieve this through a whole raft of different regulatory reforms, including the introduction of a new Ombudsman and private rented sector database.

The Act is not suitable for adoption in the Falkland Islands because it's aims are largely implemented through amendment to the Housing Act 1988, which does not apply in the Falkland Islands.

The law in the Falkland Islands in this area is very sparse and outdated, so regulatory reform would require significant review and policy development work.

k. Bus Services Act 2025 c.24

[Bus Services Act 2025](#)

The Act makes domestic provision in connection with local and school bus services so has no applicability or relevance to the Falkland Islands.

3.2.10 List any UK statutory instrument made in the reporting period in respect of which the Statute Law Commissioner wants to make a recommendation to the Legislative Assembly (POTENTIAL APPLICATION):

All UK statutory instruments made in the reporting period and considered in this report are listed in **Schedule 1** of this report.

No recommendations are made for the disapplication of any instruments which have been automatically adopted, nor for the adoption of any additional instruments.
